FOR THEIR FIRST game of the year, the Mavericks travelled to LaCrosse to face the Leopards. The Mavericks finished the first quarter ahead 19-4 and refused to let up. When the second half started, the score was 31-12, Kiowa County holding the lead. Although both teams scored ten points each in the third quarter, the Mavericks did not back down and finished the game with a victorious 55-30. Junior Riann Heft and senior Halie Headrick had the most points from the team with ten each.

The following Monday the team played Larned the first night of the Gene Keady Classic. Even though both teams were tied with nine points at the end of the first quarter, the Mavericks were unable to outscore Larned in the second quarter, which finished 17-26. Although the Mavericks scored 16 points in the final quarter, it was not enough to get the win and Larned stole it 39-50.

The Mavericks' next game of the tour-

nament was held Thursday, Dec. 6 against Macksville. Ready to redeem themselves from their loss against Larned, Kiowa County played to win. Macksville was outscored in every quarter except the third, where both teams scored 12. The Mavericks finished the game with the score of 53-22, taking home the win. Junior Heather Melton scored the most points, 11, followed by junior Katelynn Gamble and senior Angela Liggett both with ten. Melton also had the most rebounds, eight, followed by Headrick with seven.

The following Saturday, the Lady Mavs travelled back to Larned for their last game of the tournament. They faced Ellinwood, both fighting for the fifth place spot. By the end of the first half, Ellinwood was up 18 points and the score was 16-34. The Mavericks were unable to outscore Ellinwood in the third and fourth quarters and took sixth place with the game ending 60-41.



The deadline for Congress and the President to come to a decision on the issue is Dec. 31. Would You Rather: Live in the wilderness or work a minimum wage job?


"I would rather live in the wilderness because working at a minimum wage job for the rest of my life would be so miserable." A. Ford, so.

HE KCHS MEN'S basketball team ended the semester with 3-2 record. Friday, Nov. 30 they started the season against Lacrosse and won 37-35. The Keady Classic lasted December 3rd- through December 8th. The boys beat Larned on Monday and lost both Friday and Saturday against Macksville and Hoisington.

The boys C-teams traveled to Pawnee Heights to play on Dec. 9. The boys played a hard game but lost by one point.

With the clock ticking, Ardery dribbled down the court, passed the ball off to senior Damien Odle, just in time for him to make the winning shot with two seconds remaining. The crowd went wild and Odle was greeted with high fives and pats on the back by teammates and coaches. It was a close call.

Gamble and Liggett scored the most points for the Mavs during the game, Gamble with ten and Liggett with 18. Headrick and Liggett had the most rebounds from the game with seven each.

The Mavericks' next game will be held on Tuesday Dec. 18 in Fairfield. They will have a few practices over Christmas Break and will come back and play on their home court Friday Jan. 4 against Minneola.

BOOM! POW! AND Batman saves the day once again. Growing up, reading comic books was the thing to do. Common disputes were about who was better, Superman or Batman? Would you rather fly or leap buildings in a single bound? Did you get the latest issue of X-men? The list goes on, but back then we really didn't read into the actual meaning behind the action-packed plotlines and the masculine super heroes in tights.

Believe it or not, comic books have been used as forms of propaganda and advertisement ever since they came about in 1837. For instance, the first issue of Captain America, which was published in 1941, featured the patriotic hero punching out Adolf Hitler on the front cover. This received a lot of criticism mostly from Nazi sympathizers and other people who thought the dictator was Europe's problem and not the United States. However, many others saw the hero as an idol to look to in times of despair, even though he was fictional. They looked to the red, white and blue hero as a sign of hope. DO YOU KNOW the history of New Years? How it was started and how it is celebrated throughout the world?

The earliest New Year's Day celebration recorded dates back to about four thousand years ago in Babylon. The Babylonians celebrated with a festival called Akitu. On New Year's they also celebrated the victory of the Babylonian sky God Marduk over the evil sea Goddess Tiamat. Then they proceeded to crown the new king.

Throughout history, different civilizations develop more sophisticated calendars, usually pinning the first day of the New Year on an agricultural or astronomical event. Egypt, for instance, celebrates the New Year by flooding the Nile River.

In 46 B.C. the Roman ruler Julius Caesar introduced the Julian calendar, which closely resembles the calendar that we use today. Caesar instituted January 1 as the start of the New Year, partly to honor Janus, the Roman God of beginnings. They celebrated by exchanging gifts with each other, and attending parties.

The Christians temporarily replaced January 1 with days carrying more religious significance such as December 25 (the anniversary of Jesus' birth), and March 25 (the Feast of the Annunciation), then Pope Gregory XIII reestablished January 1 as New Year's day in 1582.

Many people make resolutions on New Year's. The practice of making New Year resolutions is said to have also originated in Babylonia. They made promises in order to earn the favor of the Gods and start the year off on the right foot. In the United States, the most iconic New Year's tradition is the dropping of the giant ball in New York City's Times Square. This has been a tradition since 1907. Various towns across America have developed their own versions of the Times Square ritual, organizing public drops of items ranging from pickles in Dillsburg, Pennsylvania, to possums in Tallapoosa, Georgia.
