

Mavericks take Fourth at League Tournament

On Friday, Jan. 6, the basketball team travelled to Minneola to take on the Wildcats. The Varsity pulled out a close win, with the score of 38-35. Junior Damien Odle led the team with 12 points and 11 rebounds.

The next day, the JV had a tournament at Kiowa County, their first game was against Bucklin. They won the game 54-12. Sophomores Trever Powell and Corbin VandenHoek led the team in points with Powell, 14 and VandenHoek, 12. The boys' next game was a closer one, when they took on Ashland. The game ended with Kiowa County coming out

with the win of 54-51. Again Powell and VandenHoek led the team with Powell, 17 and VandenHoek, 12. Junior Tucker McKinney also was a leading scorer with 11 points. The team finished first in the tournament.

On the 10th, the boys travelled to Jetmore to play Hodgeman County. The varsity, junior varsity and 'C' team each won their games. The JV won their game with Powell, VandenHoek and McKinney leading the team with eight points each. The varsity pulled out a close win again the Longhorns, ending the night with a win of 45-40. Junior Damien Odle led the team with 15 points and 12 rebounds.

Friday, Jan. 13, was Winter Royalty for Kiowa County. The 'C' team and JV boys played Kinsley while the varsity boys played Pawnee Heights. The 'C' team game was tough for the boys, but they pulled out a win with a close three points, ending the game 44-41. Junior Cody McVey led the team with 14 points. The JV game went really well for the boys, who won by 28 points. The final score was 57-32. Vanden-Hoek led the team with 15 points, followed by sophomore Michael Tedder with 13. The varsity went into their game also looking for a win. The team ended the first half with a lead of 51 points. Towards the end of the game Coach Perez

put in the JV players who were eager to get in the game. The boys ended the night with a win, 78-17. Junior Rustin Ardery led the team with 18 points and 12 rebounds.

On the 17th, the boys headed to Ingalls to take on the Bulldogs. The JV game went well for the boys, and they came out with a win, 53-22. Junior Mikal Behm led the team with 11 points. The varsity boys went into the second half of their game with an eight point lead. Before the end of the night, the boys led by 36. They ended the night with a winning score, 52-26. Ardery led team with 18 points and Odle led

with 11 rebounds and seven blocks.

The week of the 23rd brought a challenge for the boys as Jhey headed to Dodge City to play in the SPIAA League Tournament at the United Wireless Area, taking on the Fowler Goldbugs in the first round of game. At the end of the first half, the Mavericks led the game 28-22. The boys ended the game, pulling out a close win, with a score of 52-49. Odle led the team with 19 points and senior Montana Ralstin led with seven rebounds and six assists.

On the 27th the Mavs went back to Dodge City to take on the Ashland Bluejays. At the end of the half, the Blue Jays

were up 32-17. The second half didn't go as planned for the Mavericks and the Bluejays ended up with the win. The score ended with the Bluejays leading 62-28. Junior Mikal Behm led the team with 11 points.

The next day the boys again headed back to Dodge to play the South Gray Rebels, to play for third place honors. The score was pretty close for most of the game, but the Rebels pulled ahead in the fourth quarter, ending the game 44-37, Rebels. Junior Kendall Watson led the team in points, with 11. Ardery and Odle each led with nine rebounds.

On Friday, Jan. 6, the Lady Mavericks traveled to Minneola to face the Wildcats. By the end of the first quarter of the game, Mavericks were ahead 12-3. They managed to stay ahead the whole game, but almost lost control during the third quarter. When they entered the second half, the Mavericks were ahead 34-25, but the Wildcat's made a fast recovery and quickly caught up. In the end, Kiowa County won 43-37. Out of the game, soph. Katelynn Gamble and jr. Halie Headrick were the lead rebounders, with five each.

The following week on Tuesday, Jan. 10, the Mavericks



faced the Longhorns at Hodgeman County. After the JV girls won, the Varsity was also looking for a win. By the end of the game, Headrick had scored the most points, eight, and sophomores Riann Heft and Heather Melton each had one steal. Also, jr. Angela Liggett was the lead rebounder with three; two offensive and one defensive. At the end of the second quarter, the Mavericks were ahead 17-10. Even though the Longhorns quickly caught up in the last half, Kiowa County held their own and won, finishing the game 27-26.

For the Homecoming game on Friday, Jan. 13, the Mavericks played Kinsley. Heading into the second half two points behind, Kiowa County was looking to improve. Without being able to score in the third quarter, the Mavericks couldn't catch up and finished the game 46-59. Despite the loss, there were many highlights of the game including Melton being the lead scorer with a total of 17 points.

From Monday, Jan. 24 to Saturday, Jan. 28, KCHS participated in the League Tournament in Dodge City. The Lady Mavs first game was against the South Central Timberwolves on Monday, Jan. 24. Even though the T-Wolves beat them 51-28, some highlights of the game include Liggett finishing the game with nine points, and getting the most rebounds, four. Gamble was the second lead scorer racking up a total of eight points by the end of the game.

Their next and final game of the tournament was against the South Gray Rebels on Thursday, Jan. 26. At the end of half time, the Mavericks had a six point lead, and managed to keep a lead the rest of the game, which ended 41-36. Adding to the win, there were also many highlights of the game including Heft with the most points, 15, and Melton with the most rebounds, eight.

Although they didn't make it to the championship game, the Mavericks managed to come out with fifth place, leaving with room to improve.




