RESILENCY/JAG-K ONLINE

On a weekly basis, assignments for the week are issued on Monday, and they are due by the end of the week. We are still able to have academic remediation once a week. Students have to submit a screenshot of their grades and give a brief description of how they plan to improve any grades lower than a 70. Even through remote learning, students are still able to check in on a weekly basis by completing a Google form. On this form, students are able to discuss if they are stressed or overwhelmed with school, Fall 2020 (seniors only), journal entries about how COVID-19 has affected their way of living, and the importance of self-care.
