VARSITY & JV TEAMS WITH TOP 3 PLACINGS AT EVERY MEET

When asked what he thought about the Scholar's Bowl season so far, 7th-grader Varsity scholar Grayson Ballard said, "I think that our team has been performing well for the most part. We all have a main goal to beat Pawnee Heights, since we have taken 2nd to them 3 times in a row now. We did beat them at their home meet in head-to-head action. Everyone on our team has done a good job of answering questions and being confident to buzz in."

In Scholar's Bowl, 2 teams go head-to-head with 16 question in subjects of: 3 social sciences, 3 language arts, 3 math, 3 science, 1 fine arts, 1 miscellaneous, 1 year-in-review, and 1 sports question. Each question is worth 10 points, making it possible to have 160 total points per round. Scholars can buzz in before the question is fully done being read, but if it is answered incorrectly, 5 points are deducted from the team's score. After 16 questions, the team with the most points is declared the winner of that round, though each meet has a different amount of rounds.

At Meade, there was pool play, which consisted of 7 rounds then on to semifinals and finals for the top 4 teams. At Pawnee Heights and Ashland, there was a Round Robin, where scholars participated in 7 and 11 rounds. Coach Cade Lohrding reports that he has, "been incredibly proud of both varsity and JV teams. I am excited for us to continue our domination in the league...and BEAT PAWNEE HEIGHTS!!!" Next up for the Mavs is traveling to the Satanta meet on March 5th.

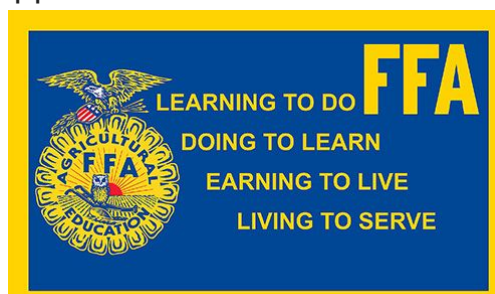

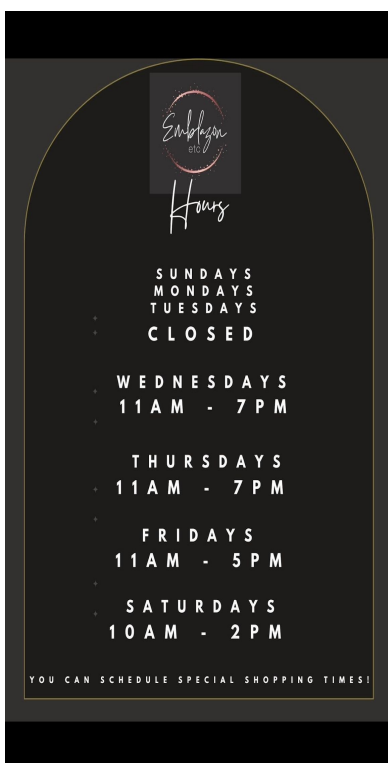

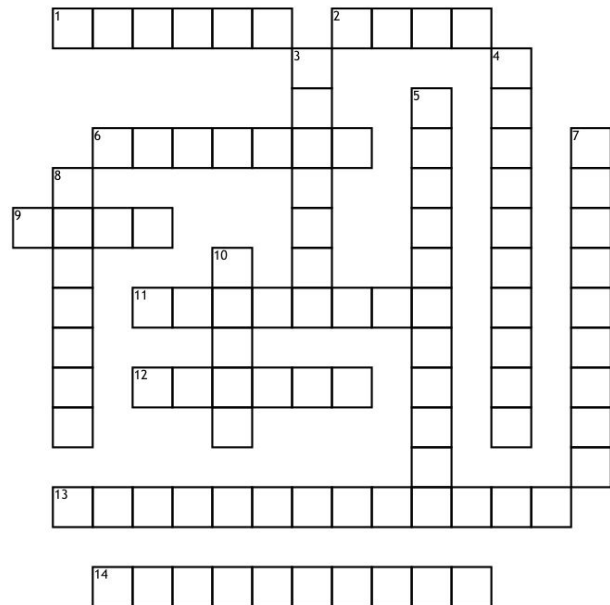
