For the last several years, the JAG Program has been participating in an event called the YEC - Youth Entrepreneurship Challenge. The YEC is an event in which students have to submit an exclusive business plan, and then continue to do a 4-minute slideshow presentation. Students spent most of the semester preparing for this competition. YEC was sponsored by NetWork Kansas and Kiowa County Economic Development, and these two organizations provided the prize money for the winners.

Additionally, there was a trade show competition in which students had a booth and 3 minutes to promote their business to the judges. Overall, over \$2,200 was given out to students for their amazing artwork.

8th grader Delaney Little, who won with fellow 8th grader Jemma Ploger, reported, "I learned how to make a business, and it helped me with my presentation skills."

Ploger reported, "It felt good to be rewarded for all of our hard work. Once we came up with what we were doing, it was fun to learn so much about photography businesses. I learned a lot about different types of pictures and prices that photography businesses require from their customers."

Mr. Mitchell, head of the JAG-K Program, reported, "All students did a fantastic job with public speaking. It also worked out that the entire KCJH body attended the awards ceremony to support their classmates. I was proud of the students' effort by getting out of their comfort zones and trying something new even though a majority of them don't want to go the entrepreneurial route. I believe this project might show some students that an entrepreneur might be an option for them."

Each and every one of the JH and High School students did a wonderful job at impressing the judges. Congratulations to all of the JAG-K students who participated in the YEC!

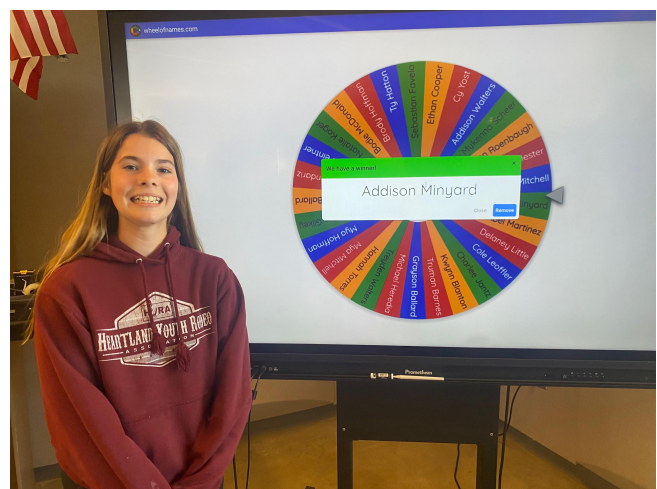
A'S FOR AIRS FOR KCJH

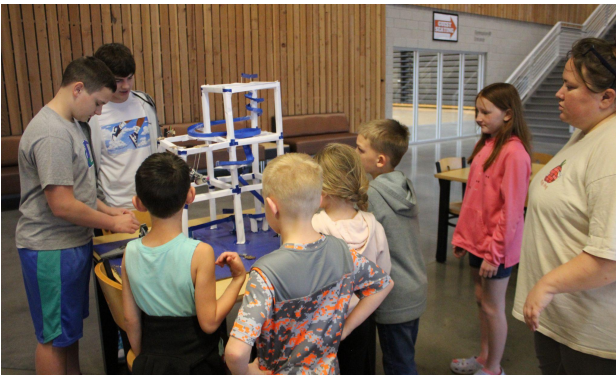
The eighth grade students made roller coasters to demonstrate the acceleration, velocity, speed, and the movement of energy in a closed environment.

LOHRDING LEARNS LESSONS IN KC

Earlier this month, Mr. Lohrding headed to Kansas City for a seminar at the National World War I Museum on Teaching American History. Mr. L applied and qualified for this opportunity and said, "I would go to any of the Teaching American History seminars. They are informative, you get to visit historical places, and you get to meet great social studies teachers from all over the country."

The seminar was facilitated by an expert on World War I, Dr. Jennifer Keene. The multi-day seminars typically run from Friday evening to Sunday afternoon. During this time, a small group of educators are immersed in learning and discussion. They have discussion sessions, shared meals, and a visit to a local historical site. Mr. L also stated, "What is nice about TAH is that they always provide more opportunities to explore and learn in my content area. They build deep rapport among their group and with their discussion leader. Depending on the topic, teachers will prepare ahead of time for seminars with about five hours of reading selected documents provided in the course packet. Once the seminar begins, the discussion leader guides a peer-to-peer, text-based conversation among all participants. New perspectives emerge as teachers share their impressions and ideas, creating deep conversations and connections to the content."

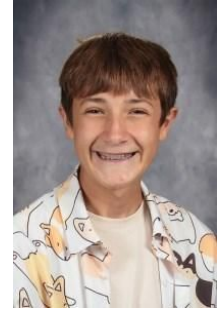

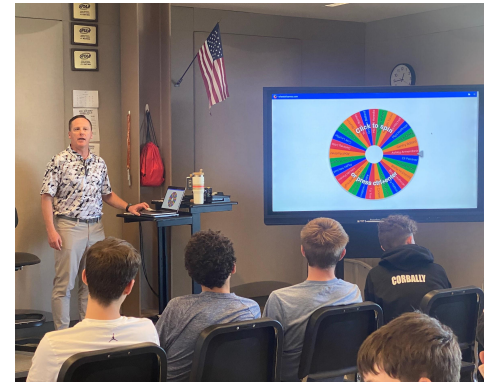
